## The Mariners' to Host US Sailing Sanctioned International Safety at Sea Hands-On Training

NEWPORT NEWS, VA — The annual Captain Henry Marx Memorial Safety at Sea course returns to The Mariners' Museum and Park on Saturday, March 1, 2025. Participants will have the opportunity to earn the International Offshore Certificate that complies with World Sailing guidelines for Personal Safety from US Sailing. This day-long course, co-sponsored by Landfall Navigation, will take place at The Mariners' and Brittingham-Midtown Aquatic Center in Newport News.

The Early Bird registration fee for the hands-on training is \$310 for the general public and \$305 for Museum Members until January 27. **After January 27, 2025, all tickets will cost \$325.** The cost covers lectures, demonstrations, course materials, lunch, a docent tour, transportation to and from the Museum and the Aquatic Center, a copy of *Safety at Sea: A Guide to Safety Under Sail and Personal Survival,* and an International Offshore Safety at Sea (ISAF) with Hands-On Training Certificate from US Sailing (valid for five years).

The hands-on training is from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. and is taught by experienced lifelong sailors and experts in their fields. Topics include lessons learned from recent incidents, fire prevention and firefighting, emergency signaling (flares), and in-the-water training in individual and group cold water survival techniques, personal safety equipment, life raft inflation, and proper wearing and rearming personal flotation devices.

Designed for crew members of offshore races, long-distance cruisers, commercial mariners, and racing sailors who want to improve their sailing skills, this course will focus on survival offshore in demanding situations and emergencies. Demand for International Offshore hands-on training in person is at an all-time high as many upcoming races now require this advanced training and certification.

The course will be moderated by retired US Navy Captain Mark Lenci. Lenci's Navy career was primarily in attack submarines and he commanded USS *Houston* (SSN 713). He has sailed primarily in New England and the Canadian Maritimes and has cruised in various areas around the world. He holds various professional certifications, including a USCG 100T Masters License and the RYA/MCA Yachtmaster Ocean Certificate of Competence. Lenci has presented at multiple Safety at Sea Courses and is considered one of the best at sharing his leadership and seamanship insights.

The Mariners' Museum International Safety at Sea Hands-On Training is the second part of earning US Sailing's International Offshore certificate.
